Candidate Bios

Editor's Note:

The declared candidates for National Offices were asked to write a simple platform based on questions commonly asked of all candidates at Conclave. The formative questions were:

- *Tell us about how you came to faith in Christ*
- *Tell us about how you are currently advancing your faith*
- *What are your goals for the office? What are your goals for the fraternity as a whole?*
- *What are specific things the fraternity can look for to determine your success in the office?*
- *Where do you see the fraternity heading during your term(s) in this office?*
- *Do you believe the national officers should take a more hands-on approach or a more hands-off approach in the business of local chapters?*

On the following pages, you will find the answers provided by the declared candidates.

Tyler Betts

Tyler Betts has a few goals for the fraternity over the next two years. First, he plans on implementing National Visions and Unity through programs and themes, to allow chapters near and far to be working on similar things with a similar focus, regardless of how many miles separate them. Second, he plans on helping organize inter-chapter events and contests, to promote a spirit of unity among brothers. Third, he desires to create a welcoming atmosphere for National discussions and programs for brothers who desire to be incorporated into such things.

Tyler's success can be measured by the Conclave by quantitative and qualitative measures. If a well-defined theme, and a program book filled with implementations of that theme are delivered, that can be counted as a success. If programs such as inter-chapter service projects, social events, and fundraising contests occur, that can be counted as a success. If optional national projects occur, such as on-line book studies and secret Santa programs occur, that can be considered a success. Also, if the fraternity grows closer together and becomes more focused and more united, that can also be considered a success.

Tyler believes the fraternity needs to do one thing above all else during his time in office, if elected, and that is to become a well-oiled machine. Communications and procedures need to become streamlined, second nature, and effective. Additionally, the fraternity should grow more effective in refining men into leaders of the church and leaders of the communities they are placed into.

Tyler sees a very large need for a hands-on approach from the National Board. But, only in areas where it is necessary. These would include communications of numbers and significant events to and from chapters, and working together to build a stronger brotherhood for each chapter individually and collectively. Outside of this, he doesn't think the National Board needs to be involved in the day-to-day work of a chapter. If the chapter desires more national input, that should be available to them, but it should never be forced upon them, where it is not necessary.

Tyler came to know Jesus Christ through the efforts of his brother, Raymond. His brother lived a life of love, service, and integrity. As he reached his early formative years, Tyler craved to have such aspects in his life. When it was revealed to him at a Newsboys concert that following Jesus Christ, and accepting him as Lord and Savior, was the path to such a life, and so much more, Tyler immediately answered a call to accept Jesus.

Currently, Tyler is advancing his faith through a number of ways. He is involved with a plant church, Journey, in Findlay, through which he not only attends weekly worship, but also attends a Bible discussion group and leads a monthly movie discussion group. Additionally, Tyler is in a couples' small group, with older couples he and his wife consider mentors. Also, Tyler's wife and supervisor are amazing examples of Christ and challenge him daily to refine his faith.

David Burden

David Burden greatly admires the job that Tyler Betts has done with this office and cannot think of specific items in which he would change or add to the office. At the same time, he will not try to be a person that he is not. His own experiences, ideas and personality will prevent him from simply copying Tyler's model, but he certainly will draw heavily upon his precedent and his advice.

The main purpose of this office, as far as David see it, deals with encouraging internal communication (chapters to nationals and vice versa) and providing opportunities for accountability when there are failures in the link. This is a true GIGO job. If chapters don't turn in info, nationals can't set up a budget, agenda, and so on. All sides need to be held accountable. Although that is primarily a VP job (with whom David plans to work), as secretary, he will pay special attention to this as a means of keeping STE on an even keel.

David Burden believes that the Office of National Secretary can be filled by the greatest candidate in the world, but without consistent, reliable cooperation from other parties the Secretary only can discuss his good intentions. However, the fraternity can expect prompt relay of the information submitted –even if it is “Chapter X- No Report” in order to provide the best information possible for the fraternity to go about its business.

David is excited at the new growth and the enthusiasm of the brotherhood. However, he does not want to ever see the fraternity grow so large or so quickly that it forgets its roots, mission and, most importantly, its Christian character. He hopes to see STE develop a more staid and professional character in its national leadership. Much has been done already in this regard and although the transition into this new mold of national officer (and HC director) may be difficult in the short run, he believes that it will provide us with much-needed stability that will in turn aid carefully managed numeric and spiritual growth.

David believes in both a hands-on and a hands-off approach for National Officers in dealing with local chapters. In his words, “Chapters are the ‘guys in the trenches’ and should be given a good deal of deference. However, chapters need to use this liberty with caution and be held accountable if their actions exceed conventional boundaries. National Officers cannot, should not, and do not want to micromanage chapters. However, they do have the obligation to advise and caution chapters based upon both their brotherhood and professional experience.”

David was raised in a church that was big on “altar calls” and public professions of faith. He did indeed respond to such an invitation to “accept Christ into his heart” as a young teen. As he grew in his faith, he became increasingly frustrated by the legalistic, “just believe” mentality of the congregation in which he was raised. He earnestly desired Christian fellowship, but wanted to find an environment that was more than believing (or wishing) really heard and particularistic rules. His involvement with STE opened his eyes to the richness of Christian belief and practice and set him on a journey of developing a much broader appreciation of the mystery and wonder of the faith- and also provided much needed glimpses of grace and the assurance that maybe he didn't need to have it “all” figured

out just yet. In this, STE gave him his initial glimpse of what one might call a “Kingdom Vision.” Though far from a perfect organization (then or now- but that’s another conversation) STE introduced David to the idea of being fellow workers with Christian brothers and with God.

In addition to attending a local congregation in Marion and joining a home group, David is also grappling with the Christian academic challenge of “integration of faith and learning.” As an historian, this leads to very complex questions of God’s sovereignty (he works at a Wesleyan-Arminian school so the issue of free will and agency are often brought into the picture there.) Much of this is truly academic, but it places him in the position of open wonder as he models not so much the “answer” as the “question” for his students. As part of this journey, he have recently been selected to attend a Lilly Foundation summer conference on Christian Scholarship at Calvin College. Without boring you with all of the details, the course is on “Biblical Studies across the Curriculum” and focuses on finding ways to, find, appreciate, articulate and celebrate Biblical Truth in classes that are not overtly religious studies classes. He is not sure exactly where this will go, but he is excited to join in this conversation. He has only been in Marion since July 2007 and has not put down many spiritual roots yet, but he hopes to also work with Emmaus and Chrysalis as time permits.

Chad Burdette

Having served as National President since 2002, if re-elected this would be Chad's final term as National President. Having a background in Public Administration Chad realizes that any organization that has a leader in the same position for too long can cause an organization to stagnate. However, organizational development does not end with changing the organization structure on paper, but is a fluid process which requires stability during periods of change. Chad would like to get the fraternity to the point where the next President can be more focused on other duties such as expansion and promotion of the fraternity and not have to deal with the structure of the organization.

Chad's goals for the office of President and the National Fraternity include:

Establishing a Firm Foundation for the New Organizational Structure:

Chad has been involved in the process from the very beginning then he is aware of the areas that need to be monitored. My main goal for my final term as National President will be to see the completion of the transition phase and the fraternity being on a solid foundation so that my successor can focus more on programming.

Establishing a Sense of Continuity in the Area of Expansion:

Under the old Constitution the duties of expansion were given to the Expansion Director a position which has been a revolving door since 2001. While the fraternity did grow during this time, it did so in small which was a rough and disjointed process. Chad has hands on experience with working with and establishing new groups and colonies and will work in conjunction with the National Pledgemaster to improve on the current programming for colonies.

Along with the expansion duties of the position, Chad's main focus for the first year would be to oversee the last few details that remain which have not been dealt with some of which include but not limited to:

- Figuring out the best way to keep the Chapter Presidents involved since the National Cabinet no longer exists
- Make sure that all documents posted are the current and correct versions.
- Work with the Chapters to help them transition local Constitutions so they are in compliance with the Nationals
- Document and distribute procedures to chapters
- Assist other National Officers as needed with transitioning positions
- Establish fraternity to the point where an Executive Director could be hired to take over the administrative operations of the fraternity.

The last year of the term Chad wants to focus on and really push expansion and promotion of the fraternity. As for a specific number of new groups Chad believes that it should be quality over quantity for new groups. Chad would focus equally on all areas of the country for expansion while recognizing the need for expansion in the west. Also during the last year Chad would like to start transitioning into the role of Executive Director.

Chad believes that chapters should be able to operate and conduct business without the direct involvement of Nationals as long as it done in the spirit of the national framework. He does think that chapters need to keep the national office informed as to the different issues and use them as a resource. There may come a time when Nationals would need to take a more active interest and role in the chapter such as when a chapter is dealing with recruitment issues.

Chad was raised in the church his whole life but, it was not until he was 12 years old that he first accepted Christ as my Savior. He was at Bible camp and that day we had to do an activity which he did not want to do because he was afraid of heights but finally did. That night the counselor gave the nightly devotion and related the message to the activity we did and the difficulty Chad had doing the activity and the message he presented just made everything “click” for him. After that, Chad coasted for awhile slowly growing in his Christian walk. The first real test he had was his sophomore year of college when his father was killed. This happened the same semester he was pledging STE, which was in hindsight something he needed at that point in his life. He feel that God meant for him to pledge that year instead of the previous year to show me that even in the darkest days of his life he will be there to help him and bring the things he need into his life. This is the first time he had truly felt God’s peace because, if he though that if he did not have that peace and the group of brothers he brought into my life at that time Chad would have become someone completely different.

When Chad moved to Albany in July, one of the first things that he made a point of doing was finding a church to attend. For the first few months, he visited many different churches in the area from small congregations to community churches to large churches. Finally, after his tour of churches it came down to two churches which were both within reasonable distances from his house. Once he narrowed it down, he met with both pastors about the church community and ways that he could get involved in the church. Finally, he chose Bethlehem Community Church, which has a medium sized congregation, due to the many opportunities to get involved. Soon after he went through the membership course and became an official member of the church in December. Chad currently attends a weekly home group and has been talking with the administrative pastor about starting a college aged/young professional group through the church. He also attends the weekly meeting of ByGrace which is a group of 20-30 year olds that meets weekly for worship and discussion. Overall, living in the Northeast has been and continues to be a very big adjustment in his spiritual life due to the fact that this area of the country is somewhat “spiritually cold”, as his pastor puts it. In addition to the groups he attends, he has been meeting with the pastor on a regular basis as a means of transitioning in to the spiritual climate of the area.

Alex Johnson

Alex would like the Treasurer to move from a strong-armed, money-man to helping chapters to raise funds during the year, and helping chapters achieve what they want. He would like to get more merchandise available to brothers to help “get the word out”. Alex would also like to get this whole pin mess cleaned up. He hopes that doesn't mean switching suppliers, but it is what it is. This will most likely be his last term as Treasurer, if elected, so he would like to help mentor a replacement to step into this role in 2 years. He would like STE as a whole to grow to become the largest Christian Fraternity in the country. He would love for us to have 100 chapters.

Conclave can ask the follow questions to determine his success:

1. How did Conclave go?
2. Did you get your pins on time?
3. Are you getting the help you need to help fundraise?

Alex sees the fraternity growing in the next two years. Continue to mold into the new infrastructure. This is a change that is happening currently, but is nowhere near complete. He wants to see that completion come much closer to occurring.

Alex believes the National Board should not be involved in local business, but should be involved in helping chapters achieve goals. National officers have seen chapters struggle with the same things over and over again, and he would love to help.

Alex did not include an answer to how he came to faith in Christ, but added that he actively tries to live out that faith daily. He and his wife are still adjusting to life in their new area, and are still looking for a church, having tried out six, and still looking for a good fit. They also frequently visit with Christian friends to grow and challenge their faith.

Shannon Wagers

Shannon's feelings on goals for any office are that they are not to be separate from the needs of the local brothers and the National Brotherhood on the whole. His personal goal is to be a servant leader, to inspire and empower, and further refine men for the cause of the Kingdom of Christ. Though not possible at all times, Shannon's aim is to get to know the local brother at the personal level, by having an "open door" policy and quickly responding to any questions and concerns. Shannon desires to see qualitative and quantitative growth on the local and National levels and to further enrich the lives of the Brotherhood. Lastly, Shannon would like to lead the cultivation of future leaders in Sigma Theta Epsilon, by building into the Brotherhood. Shannon states, "The failure to see beyond our own life span is a real hindrance. Good Christians live the life. They walk with God and serve with integrity. 'Great' Christians leave a legacy. They live the life and pass it on and you see generations of legacy of growth in Christ." Shannon desires to see Sigma Theta Epsilon filled with "Great Christians."

Shannon believes that the metrics of success can be rather relative and subjective when dealing in fraternal matters. His heart leads him to James 5:12 (NIV): Above all, my brothers, do not swear—not by heaven or by earth or by anything else. Let your "Yes" be yes, and your "No," no, or you will be condemned. This verse has meant a great deal to Shannon, as he has held to it since Conclave 2003, where he gained election to his first term as National Vice President. Shannon believes that being a man of your word, being transparent in personal thoughts and feelings, and being held accountable in an individual's actions by doing things "the right way", are closest metrics that we as men can use to measure his or anyone's "success" while in service of the National Brotherhood. As we are fellow workers with God, however, Shannon feels truly that we can never measure "success" on this side of heaven. He is reminded of a song by 4Him that states, "What's in the heart defines -The measure of a man." To that point, Shannon believes only God can define success.

Shannon's vision of fraternal direction is one of further growth. This is not only in hopeful expansion, but growth of the individual brother. He envisions each brother being able to grow in his personal walk much greater than before. The key is two fold. First is the role of Nationals to implement the correct systems to address outages and improving the current ones as needed. Filling the needs of the local brother is dear to his heart. This fraternity is only as strong as its weakest link. Secondly holding each brother accountable to each other in every relationship, whether it is a National or local one. Without this accountability, nothing can be gained, and any forward momentum is lost. Each brother plays a special role that Shannon feels that is divinely appointed. If the Brotherhood individually or collectively falls short, the brotherhood is robbing itself of its own blessing

In Shannon's view, the role of Nationals is empowering the local chapters to be the best fellow workers possible. Ecclesiastics 3:1 states, "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven." To this end, Shannon believes there are times Nationals must be more hands on with a certain chapter or issue than others. Shannon borrows a phrase from church philosophy "In essentials, unity; in non-essentials, liberty; in

all things love.” He believes there must be established degrees of unity in nationally impacting items, but there are occasions that are chapter-centric. He firmly believes the way things are handled must always be in the Spirit of Philoi.

Shannon was raised by Christian parents and attended church affiliated with the Southern Baptist Convention. Around the age of 10, he realized the need for the Savior in his life, and privately asked Jesus into his heart. On August 13, 1986, Shannon made his public profession of faith on a youth retreat at Camp Kern in Lebanon, Ohio. The following week, Shannon followed with baptism at his church.

Shannon currently attends First Church of God (Hamilton) located in Fairfield Township, Ohio. He has attended there for the last six years. Currently, Shannon and his wife Ruth are helping to build attendance at the 9 AM service in a response to a challenge of his pastor Dr. Keith Gebhart, as his congregation is one of the fastest growing churches in southwest Ohio. Shannon currently has two mentors that he leverages to gain Christian growth. One is his pastor Dr. Gebhart, and the other is his father-in-law, John Murphy, who is the pastor of Newbern Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Pulaski, Virginia. Key day-to-day things that Shannon seeks in advancing his faith are a regular prayer and devotional time and weekly attendance at his local church. Shannon also regularly seeks Christian television programming for nationally renowned speakers, such as Hillsong Australia’s Brian Houston. In addition, with the advent of the iPod, Shannon has been afforded the opportunity to add podcasts to his devotional time and is able to listen to them while at work. His rotation includes Liquid Church, Chip Ingram, Ed Young, and Christian Financial Counselors Dave Ramsey and Howard Dayton.

Tony Reiger

Tony's goals for the Housing Corporation are to continue its growth and working towards one day being able to maintain a house for every chapter. Also, to improve communication between local chapters and nationals about how the HC is going about growth and to why the HC is doing the various things it is doing. Additionally, as CFO he would like to work towards finding new ways of building HC's capitol. He believes that looking at how well he achieves his goals and the goals of the fraternity is a good way to determine his success in that role.

He sees the fraternity continuing to grow during his time, and with the recent changes in the constitution, he sees some amazing things happening. As far as whether or not he believes that nationals should be more hands on or more hands off, it really depends on the issue. In some situations, it is definitely beneficial to have a national organization that is right there helping out, however the local chapters do need to have the freedom to grow on their own within the framework that nationals has established. For more detail Tony would be happy to discuss this in person.

Tony came to know Christ when he was young, there was no specific moment, but his family attended church on a regular basis and it was through these experiences that he got to know Christ and accepted Him into his heart as Lord and Savior. As Tony got older, however, he became very involved with sports and various other activities that drew him away from church.

He wouldn't say he was a bad kid, but he did get in trouble a few times while in High School and knew that there was something missing in his life. After some soul searching, he knew that it was God that was missing, that he wasn't actively following Him. He struggled while still in high school to get involved in church and in other Christian organizations, never quite finding my place.

However, he was truly blessed when he came to college. He first got involved with Athletes in Action, then it was at a Campus Crusade for Christ meeting that he met some of the brothers in Sigma Theta Epsilon, there was an instant connection. They were a part of something that he knew he wanted to be a part of, too. Admittedly, he didn't know much about the organization when he was first asked to put in a bid to join, as he had only met some of the brothers a few weeks before, but he felt God calling him and jumped at the opportunity. In his words, "it was without a doubt one of the best decisions I ever made in my life. I knew instantly I was where God wanted me. I had found a home and a place to grow amongst other Christian men seeking the same."

Editor's note: Per revision to the HC Code expected to go into effect on April 13th, election of HC Directors will be done by the National Board, not the Conclave. This inclusion is not for voting purposes, but to introduce Tony to the chapters, in the event he is elected by the Board to serve on the HC.

- I. Conclave Role Call/Announcements
 - a. Conclave Roll Call
 - b. Announcements
- II. Elections
 - a. Nominations
 - i. Opened by presiding officer
 - ii. Closed by motion to close
 - b. Candidate Speeches (only if running opposed) – 2 minutes for each candidate
 - c. Questions for Candidates
 - i. The time period for questions shall be the sum total of 5 minutes per candidate
 - ii. Each individual response shall be limited to 2 minutes
 - d. Call for vote – may come earlier with a motion to vote
 - e. Candidate leaves the room
 - f. Discussion
 - i. Limited to 5 minutes
 - ii. No individual may speak for more than 1 minute without relinquishing the floor
 - g. Vote
- III. Business Items
 - a. Presentation of Proposal
 - b. Authorship Speech
 - c. Questions for Clarification
 - d. Discussion of Proposal
 - i. No individual may speak for more than 2 minutes without relinquishing the floor
 - e. Vote
- IV. Budget (Not to Exceed 15 Minutes)
 - a. Presentation of Budget
 - b. Discussion
 - c. Amendments
 - d. Vote to Accept

These rules of order may be suspended at the discretion of the presiding officer or by a motion from the floor (i.e. "I move to extend discussion ____ minutes") and majority approval

--All questions, concerns, or comments must come from delegates. audience members must remain quiet and will not be allowed to ask questions

--The Executive Director, Past National Officers, and Housing Corporation members may provide input and ask questions

--The rights to ask questions and provide input given to delegates, and Past National Officers and HC members will also be extended to National Officer and Housing Corp members elect, immediately following the vote to elect them
